Summary of Senate Bill 13

Senate Bill 13 primarily focuses on the regulation of school district library materials and catalogs, parental rights regarding these materials, and the establishment of local school library advisory councils.

Key provisions of the bill include:

Parental Access and Restrictions:

It amends the Education Code to grant parents access to their child's school records, specifically including library materials. Parents are also given the right to restrict their child's access to certain materials and receive records of their child's library usage

Content Standards:

The bill defines terms like "harmful material," "indecent content," "library material," and "profane content." It establishes standards for school library collections, explicitly prohibiting certain types of content.

Local School Library Advisory Councils:

The legislation mandates the creation of these councils to ensure community values are reflected in library catalogs. These councils will advise on the acquisition and removal of library materials, with their recommendations being considered by the board of trustees


Acquisition and Challenge Process:

The bill details the procedures for acquiring new library materials and for challenging existing materials..

Policy and Standards:

The Texas Education Agency is required to adopt a model policy for library material acquisition, which school districts must then adopt. Additionally, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission must adopt standards for school library collection development.

The Act is scheduled to begin with the 2025-2026 school year and will take effect immediately if it passes with a two-thirds vote in each house, or on September 1, 2025, otherwise.



School District Compliance Actions for SB 13

To help districts navigate Senate Bill 13, here's a breakdown of the key steps and activities they'll need to consider for compliance

Adopt and Implement Policies & Standards

- Adopt a Model Policy: School districts must adopt a model policy for the acquisition of library materials, as developed by the Texas Education Agency (TEA).
- Comply with Collection Development Standards: School districts must adhere to standards for school library collection development adopted by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission.
- Prohibit Certain Content: Implement policies to prohibit "harmful material," "indecent content," and "profane content" in school library collections, as defined by the bill

Establish and Utilize Local School Library Advisory Councils

- Create Councils: Each school district must establish local school library advisory councils.
- Reflect Community Values: Ensure these councils are structured to reflect community values in their recommendations for library catalogs.
- Consider Recommendations: The board of trustees must consider the recommendations made by these advisory councils regarding the acquisition and removal of library materials.

Manage Library Material Acquisition and Challenges

- Implement Acquisition Process: Follow the detailed acquisition process outlined in the bill for all new library materials.
- Implement Challenge Process: Establish and follow a defined process for challenging existing library materials within the school district.

Facilitate Parental Rights and Access

- Provide Catalog Access: Ensure parents have access to their child's school library catalog.
- Enable Restriction Requests: Allow parents to request and implement restrictions on their child's access to specific library materials.
- Provide Usage Records: Furnish parents with records of their child's library usage upon request.
- Grant Access to Records: Ensure parents have access to their child's school records, specifically those pertaining to library materials obtained from the school library.

School District Compliance Actions for SB 13

Training and Awareness

While not explicitly stated as a direct "action," implied compliance would require training staff (librarians, administrators) on the new definitions of prohibited content, the new acquisition and challenge processes, and how to facilitate parental access and restriction requests

Funding Update

Cunningham amendment to C.S.S.B. 13 is as follows: (d) Notwithstanding Section 31.0211(c), a school district or openenrollment charter school may use funds from the district's or school's instructional materials and technology allotment under Section 31.0211 for costs associated with complying with this section
